Definitions

General

Students	all persons attending public, private, homeschool or online
	educational programs
Non-competitive	LHJF participants that receive feedback but are not scored
Accompanying	non-competitive musician(s) that accompany competitive solo
musicians	entries, vocal combos or vocal large ensembles. Non-students are
	permissible as accompanying musicians.

Competition Levels

Elementary	an LHJF competition level including students in grades 6 and under
Junior	an LHJF competition level including students in grades 6 - 9
Senior	an LHJF competition level including students in grades 9 – 12
College	students enrolled in a college or university during the semester in
	which LHJF occurs
Open	an LHJF competition level including non-students

Note: entries in the 6th or 9th grade must register in the competition level that applies to their school. A 6th grader enrolled at an elementary school should register as "elementary," and a 9th grader enrolled at a high school should register as "senior". 6th and 9th graders enrolled at a middle school or junior high should register as "junior."

Divisions

Senior entries will be placed into Divisions based on the population of their school.

Competition Rules

Locations & Schedule

Competitive performances take place in several venues across the University of Idaho campus where performers will receive scores and feedback from world-class adjudicators. A winner and runner up will be selected for every category and division in a performance room.

For each entry, a designated warm up room will be available with basic amenities (see Equipment & Amenities section for more detail). The performance AND adjudication clinic take place in a nearby venue. Time is limited in the warm up and performance rooms, as follows:

Scoring

Each entry will receive a score out of 100 in the following criteria. The overall score will be calculated out of 100 using the indicated weighted percentages.

Results

Winners and runners up are selected from each performance room based on their overall scores. The winners and runners up will be verbally announced during the evening concert and published on the LHJF website.

Directors will receive the following results via email.

Within 24 hours of the completed competition:

- Overall weighed and criteria scores
- Category & Division average scores

Within 30 days of the festival:

- Category & Division winners as announced during the evening concert
- Video recording of competitive performance and adjudicator clinic

Awards

All winners will receive a trophy and certificate, and runners-up will receive a certificate. Trophies may be retrieved by the entry director at the evening concert. Any awards not picked up will be shipped to the mailing address provided during the registration process.



LHJF Sweepstakes Competition

Nominations

Vocal and instrumental large ensembles are eligible for the Lionel Hampton Jazz Festival Sweepstakes Competition. Adjudicators review the scores and daytime performances to select outstanding nominees for the Sweepstakes Competition.

Senior level nominees are required to attend the evening concert to compete live on the ICCU Arena main stage. The winner will be selected by a panel of adjudicators.

Wednesday: One (1) outstanding junior ensemble will be selected and announced as a Sweepstakes winner. Attendance at the evening concert is not required to win.

Thursday: Two (2) outstanding senior vocal large ensembles will be nominated and compete for the Sweepstakes Competition.

Friday: Two (2) outstanding senior instrumental large ensembles will be nominated and compete for the Sweepstakes Competition.

Awards

Winners of the Sweepstakes Competition receive a rotating Sweepstakes trophy at the evening concert and free admission for one ensemble in the following year's Lionel Hampton Jazz Festival.

Avista Scholarship Competition

Nominations

Senior vocal and instrumental soloists are eligible for the Avista Scholarship Competition, provided they are present at the evening concert. Adjudicators review the scores and daytime performances to select outstanding nominees for the Avista Scholarship Competition.

Thursday: Two (2) outstanding vocal soloists will be nominated for the Avista Scholarship Competition. The nominees will perform live in Thursday evening's main stage concert at the ICCU Arena. The winner and runner up will be selected by a panel of adjudicators.

Friday: Outstanding instrumental soloists will be nominated for the Avista Scholarship Competition. The nominees will perform as a combo live in Friday evening's main stage concert at the ICCU Arena. The winner and runner up will be selected by a panel of adjudicators.

Awards

The winners receive \$1,500 and the runners up receive \$1,000 in an Avista scholarship to use toward any degree at the University of Idaho.



Equipment & Amenities

The following equipment will be available in warm up and performance rooms. Please bring your own cymbals, maximum of two.
