EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Compared to college students from city, suburb, or town home communities, students from rural home communities


Figure 1. College Students' Age by Degree of Urbanization of Students' Permanent Address

- are more likely to be 30 or older (Figure 1)


Figure 2. Percent of Students who are Independent and Unmarried/Married with Dependents, by Degree of Urbanization of Students' Permanent Address

- are more likely to be married or unmarried with dependents (Figure 2)
- are more likely to have earned a GED or other equivalency exam (Figure 3)

STUDENTS' AGE

Thirty five percent of rural students attending public or private 4-year institutions are 30 years old or older, which is the highest percent by degree of urbanization of students' permanent address.

We analyzed data from the 2019-2020 National Postsecondary Student Aid Study (NPSAS). The National Center for Education Statistics has overseen data collection for the NPSAS every 3-4 years since 1987.
